
Cities are organisms that ebb and flow, and their processes of cyclical growth and regression produce urban fractures with strong, ambivalent connotations and potential.

Terrains vagues and urban voids can be seen as a subversive version of Henri Lefebvre's "spaces of representation": intricate, intimate, and multilayered spaces that allow to scrutinize the deficiencies of "representations of space," or designed and planned spaces, while also providing a temporary respite from dominant "spatial practices," or ingrained behaviors that reinforce spatial norms. As counter-spaces, these sites contain fragmented shared histories, shedding light on the imperfect process of recalling and reconstructing the past.

In "Le droit à la ville", Henri Lefebvre argued that the pursuit of an ideal community could only be achieved through the study of everyday life in urban settings, which he called "experimental utopia." Lefebvre believed that the dreams of today could be used to build the city of tomorrow, but this would require architects and urban planners to appreciate the significance of the lived experiences of those who inhabit the real world. Lefebvre saw everyday life as a space with the potential for transformation: everydayness is not inherently bleak and unchanging, he argued, but rather full of unrealized possibilities. His proposal implied that there is a world to be discovered and appreciated within the existing context.

Starting from Thierry Paquot's definition of the city as "a happy combination of three qualities, urbanity, diversity, and alterity (and if one of these qualities were to lack, the spirit of cities would collapse)", this BIP is interested in discussing the varied panoply of interactions between the "I" and the "Other" from their anthropologic, sociologic and urban perspective.

"INHABITING LIMINALITY" BIP asks in what way is architecture able to operate in terrains vagues without becoming a forceful tool of authority and theoretical reasoning. The answer lies in paying heed to continuity - not the continuity of the organized, productive, and authorized city, but rather the continuity of the movements, the forces, the cadences created by the passage of time and the relinquishing of boundaries.





























LECTURES/ PANELS TOPICS:

- Liminality and transformation: exploring the transformative potential of urban voids, terrain vagues, interstitial spaces, non-places.
- Reimagining urban narratives: challenging the dominant narratives of the city.
- Collaborative design processes, collective action, revitalization/ reinvigoration of spaces through common / collective usage, urban gardening, housing/ artistic squats etc.
- Urban ecology strategies.
- Crossing urban thresholds: the significance of urban thresholds as transitional spaces that mediate between different environments, cultures, and experiences.
- Decent housing solutions for the homeless.

WORKSHOP TOPICS:

<u>The architecture of thresholds. Interventions in the public space</u>: students will be invited to explore the transformative potential of in-between spaces; looking at ways in which undefined spaces can serve as catalysts for change, enabling the emergence of new identities, narratives, and forms of urban life.

Reimagining Urban voids: discovering the hidden potential of the terrain vague: through creative exercises and storytelling techniques, participants will explore alternative narratives and will reimagine the potential of urban voids, urban thresholds, terrain vague and non-places in shaping urban discourse.

<u>Collaborative design processes</u>: while emphasizing the importance of collaborative design processes in unlocking the potential of these spaces, participants will learn about participatory methodologies, co-design approaches, and inclusive practices that engage diverse stakeholders in the reimagining and transformation of urban voids.





Claudia Pipoş is a lecturer at the University of Architecture and Urbanism "Ion Mincu" in Bucharest, at the Department of "Architectural Design Fundamentals." Her teaching activities are complemented by her involvement as a member of the organizing team and/or curator of numerous workshops and thematic exhibitions.


Starting in 2022, she has been an associate editor of the editorial team for the "Argument" journal, published by the University of Architecture and Urbanism "Ion Mincu" in Bucharest. "Argument" encompasses a series of research papers in the fields of architecture, urban planning, interior design, and related areas, authored by both Romanian and international contributors. Additionally, Claudia Pipos is a member of the organizing team and co-moderator of the annual scientific communication sessions of the "ARGUMENT" JOURNAL.

She recently obtained her doctoral degree in architecture, with her doctoral research focused on temporary architecture and strategies for regenerating urban interstices, a highly relevant topic considering that cities face numerous issues related to unused, abandoned, or underutilized spaces. Claudia aimed to find creative and sustainable solutions for transforming these interstices into multifunctional temporary spaces that contribute to urban revitalization. Claudia Pipoş explores in her research the potential of temporary architecture to provide a possible solution to the issue of urban interstitial spaces, an instrument that addresses both the city's need for renewal and objectives such as sustainability and urban environment flexibility. Through alternative, scalable approaches, these spaces can be brought back into the center of the architectural discourse.



Ionuţ Tudor is currently visiting professor at the Faculty of Journalism and Communication Studies, University of Bucharest, where he teaches Ethics, critical thinking and academic integrity and Communication Law, and is also consultant for public administration at ACZ Consulting.

His educational background covers bachelor's degrees in the domains of philosophy and law, a MA in European Law, and a PhD on Torts in Comparative Law.





























He was involved in the organizing of the Biennial for Contemporary Art Periferic 8, activated as an expert on the legislation of the higher education system at UEFISCDI, legal counselor for the "Cultural Centre for Image and Sound". Currently he is focused on strategic approaches to public policies, elaboration of strategies for the central and local public administration and evaluations of various operational programmes.



Vasile Ernu is a writer, winner of numerous awards, with books translated into more than ten languages. He was born in the USSR in 1971. He graduated with a master's degree in philosophy from Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj, Romania in 1997. Art/Heriot-Watt University and a first degree in Architecture-Engineering from the National Technical University of Athens.


Throughout her academic career, dr. Krystallia Kamvasinou was appointed as Post-doctoral Research Fellow at the University of Westminster from 2007-10. Between February 2011 and September 2012, she was Project Research and Development Officer for Build Up, the Professional Development and Consultancy Centre at the School of Architecture and the Built Environment.

Between 2012-14, she was employed as Research Fellow funded by the Leverhulme Trust (RF-2012-518) to do research on 'Interim spaces and creative use', including an international best practice and policy review, as well as an empirical study focusing on London's temporary land use initiatives since 2008, and a research project on wellbeing, greenspace and COVID-19 (2019-2021, funded by the Sustainable Cities and Urban Environments research community and the Quintin Hogg Trust). She has published widely and is a reviewer for academic journals, including Urban Studies and Landscape Research.



Sara Brysch is an Architect and a PhD candidate at Faculty of Architecture and the Built Environment, Delft University of Technology, focusing on the design of affordable collaborative housing. He is a specialist in International Cooperation for Latin America and Africa by the Institute for Cooperation and Basic Habitability of the Technical School of Architecture in Madrid, where he also obtained a PhD in Vitality and Sustainability of Urban Peripheries.

He is currently a doctoral candidate in Artistic Education at the Faculty of Fine Arts of the University of Porto, where he is dedicated to research on Urbanism and Art Education and takeworks on the theme Relationality and Territory.

He regularly publishes, as well as attending international congresses and scientific meetings as a way of validating the knowledge produced, and he is a member of the Intercultural Identities movement.

In 2004 he worked as an intern at Souto de Moura associated architects in the development of ten underground stations of the metro of Porto and in the development of the Piazza del Municipio station and the metro in Naples. After several years of work in a liberal profession, developing different residential and urban projects, he is once again developing teaching in Cape Verde, atM EIA - University Institute of Art, Technology and Culture in Mindelo.

He was a consultant at the Ministry of Environment and Climate Action of Portugal, and at the Ministry of Infrastructure, Spatial Planning and Housing of Cape Verde, and coordinator of the OUTROS BAIRROS / Other Neighborhoods Initiative, a pilot experience for urban rehabilitation of auto constructed areas in Cape Verde, cherishing the way of life of the population.



Rafael de Balanzo, EU registered architect, MLA, Ph.D. in Sustainability Science, is the founder of the Urban Resilience Thinking Design Studio. He is currently a faculty of the Math & Science Department (SLAS), at the Graduate Center of Planning and Environment (GCPE) at Pratt School of Architecture (SoA), senior researcher for the Pratt NSF-funded project, Exploring Transdisciplinary Approaches to STEM Teaching and Learning and active collaborator of the Pratt Public Sphere.

His research in Sustainability science used the resilience thinking design approach by understanding the social-technological-ecological systems dynamics and cycles of change in linked complex adaptive systems such as cities, communities, and buildings. He is a member of the Habitat Action Without Borders Work Program of the Architects Without Borders International (ASF-int), he received the 2021-2023 Russell Sage Research Project Grant Award and the 2022-23 CUNY Interdisciplinary Research Grant. He previously received architecture awards from the Belgium Government and the Associations of Spanish and Catalan Architects and he was the





























recipient of the 2019 Colombia Fulbright Chair for Urban Resilience at Del Tolima University, Ibague, Colombia. He is also a Social Practice CUNY Graduate Center fellowship 2022/23, adjunct professor at Queens College, CUNY; EINA School of Design at the University Autonoma de Barcelona and visiting professor at ENSAP School of Architecture and Landscape in Bordeaux in France and Politecnico di Milano, Italy. He taught previously at the University Pompeu Fabra, ELISAVA School of Engineering and Design, Barcelona, Spain, and the University of Southampton, Winchester School of Art, UK.



Florin Poenaru is a lecturer in Sociology and Anthropology in the Department of Sociology and Social Work, University of Bucharest. He has a PhD in social anthropology from Central European University, Budapest and was a Fulbright Visiting Scholar to City University of New York. He works on issues related to class, post-socialism and global history of Eastern Europe and teaches classes on contemporary theories in sociology and anthropology. He is a co-editor of CriticAtac, founding member of LeftEast and regular contributor to Bilten. His latest book is *Locuri comune: clasă, anti-comunism, stânga, Tact, 2017*. He also took part in over a dozen election monitoring missions across Eastern Europe, the Balkans and the Middle East.



Fabiano Micocci is an Assistant Professor at the Department of Architecture at the University of Thessaly, Greece. He holds a bachelor and postgraduate degree from University of Roma Tre, and a PhD in Architecture and Urban Design from the University of Florence, with a focus on Mediterranean architecture after the Second World War. He taught at the University of Florence, the Lebanese American University, Portsmouth University and in many international workshops and summer schools. Currently he is teaching at the MArch in Architecture and Urbanism at the Metropolitan College of Athens and at the University of Thessaly in Volos. He has participated in many conferences and has taken part in various architectural competitions, receiving several prizes. He is a co-founding member of NEAR Architecture, a





























design and research practice based in Athens and Rome, that received the NIB prize -section landscape- in Italy in 2013. He is Senior Associate at Urban Transcripts and editor of the on-line research project The Athens Project. In 2015 he worked on an urban strategy for the post-conflict area of Tripoli, in Lebanon, and he curated a monographic issue of the journal Camera Cronica focused on refugees and urbanization in Lebanon.



Tino Buchholz holds a Master in Urban Planning from the University of Dortmund (Germany) and a PhD from the University of Groningen (The Netherlands). Focused on the sociology of urban conflict and urban movements he looks at forms of life as forms of housing: with respect to property-led urbanization, political justice, community formation and migration. His publications target the legitimacy of legal housing standards in Western & Eastern Europe; social housing, squatting, property guardianship and critical urban theory. Expanding the scope of urban sociology he works as producer and director at TUNi productions, urban research & documentary film (http://www.tuniproductions.com/).



Silviu Medeşan is an architect, researcher and social designer working and living in Cluj, member of National Order of Architects - Transylvanian Branch, president of Sustainable Organized Society Association, and alumni of Actors of Urban Change Program by Robert Bosch Foundation (Stuttgart).

He holds a PhD at Technical University of Cluj-Napoca with the title Form follows Situation - Contemporary city as foreseen by the Situationists. He continues to conduct practice-based research on civic participation in urban regeneration. His approach is focused on the creation of urban 'situations' and the role of architects in processes of co-production of space and urban resilience. This approach is enhanced by his urban activism engagement in community activation projects using cultural means, participatory methods of co-designing public spaces and campaigns for a resilient and nature-friendly city. This engagement has been successful, and the results are now visible in the city: a riverbank was protected from car traffic and is





























now transformed into a park, a green area and a cultural center were created in a mass housing neighborhood, following the local civic engagement he co-initiated. He has been successful in securing grants for practice-based research ('La Terenuri' project, publication grants), and has published 2 books and 6 articles and book chapters. He has also acted as adviser for urban policy for Romanian Parliament MPs and municipal political representatives proposing improvements for urban projects.

He worked in Romania, Hungary, Russia (Krasnoyarsk) and presented his work and academic research in Germany, The Netherlands, Bulgaria, Moldova and universities from Romania (Cluj, Bucharest) and the UK (Sheffield, Edinburgh, Dundee, Nottingham). He published cARTier. Peripheral Interventions (2016) and currently he's editing a book based on his PhD thesis.

He is currently working in architecture projects, urban planning, architectural research and sustainable development.



Dragoş Dascălu is an architect, PhD, Associate Professor at the Technical University of Cluj-Napoca, Faculty of Architecture and Urban Planning.

He teaches Sociology, Ethics and he is a part of the Architectural Design Studio team (2nd year). He is equally a member of the Planeta Petrila and the Center for the Built Environment NGOs. His research focus themes are the study of the influence of architectural processes in trust building between the different actors involved; participatory architectural processes; the study of different possible strategies through which architectural practices can engage the citizens / users.

Dragoș Dascălu has worked as a coordinator of the StartUp Petrila urban regeneration project between 2-12-2018, looking at the complex relationships between industrial heritage and the citizens.


